BENEFITS PROGRAM REPORT

The role of District Health Convener has been shared by George and Gwen this year. George Meek, after fifteen years of service in this role for District 23, retired from this position in February 2021. Gwen was appointed to the role at that time. George has provided excellent service for the district and Gwen will do her best to maintain his standards. Thank you, George.

As District Health Representative, part of the role is to share information and answer some of your questions concerning the RTO/ERO Group Insurance Plans. In addition, the DHR provides feedback to the Central Benefits Committee to assist in the continuing development and expansion of the plans

to meet the needs of our members. George attended the RTO/ERO DHR Health Seminar last year. The next DHR Health seminar will take place in the Fall of 2021 and Gwen will attend on your behalf.

An important part of the DHR role is communication with members. You will have seen articles in STONY Bridges and the E-Newsletter; and heard brief presentations at meetings and events. The RTO/ERO Insurance Plans Booklet 2020 is your main source of information and is published every 3 years. 'Communiqué – Health Benefits Updates 2021' provides information of updates and changes to the plans. Both of these documents are available

on the RTO/ERO Website. Watch for Health Matters in each Renaissance Magazine for health-related insights.

There were several changes to the plans by RTO/ERO Benefits Committee which were implemented in January 2021. Of note are the following:

- Plan Surplus from 2020 is being applied directly to you in two ways. First, by a reduction of 3% to premiums for each the three plans (Extended Health Care, Dental, and Hospital and Convalescent Care), and second by subsidization of premiums for the next five years, to keep changes as low as possible.
- You are now able to have more practitioners electronically bill directly to the plan. This speeds up your claim and you only pay for the remaining portion of the service that is not covered.
- Dental Plan reimbursements will be updated to the 2021 fee guide for general practitioners.

- Best Doctors continues to offer a range of services for Extended Health Care plan members and their immediate families.
- There are improvements to the Travel Insurance in the areas of Pandemic Travel Coverage, Trip Cancellation or Interruption, Continued Care while Travelling and the Stability clause. Please check in your Insurance Plan Booklet and Communiqué of 2021 for complete information about these changes.

With the Pandemic this year there have been frequent changes to the plan, particularly as it related to travel. It is recommended that you check your plan booklet and any supplemental information that has been sent to ensure that you have the latest information when making your plans. Hopefully we will have more travel in the future. Meanwhile, stay safe, stay healthy and keep smiling.

BOOK CLUB REPORT

Database Maintenance

The RTOERO monthly change lists continue to update our database, providing us with the contact information for each of our new members as well as providing key changes to email addresses. Members must notify the Provincial RTO/ERO Office of all changes to their personal contact information

for us to resume. We shall hope to continue meeting at Willowdale United Church as we have been doing for so many years.

(phone, home address, email addresses) – we cannot make these updates at our local level.

The role of the Convener (who works with a committee from time to time) is set out as follows:

- i. To be responsible for monitoring the currency of the Constitution, Policy and, District Job Descriptions and bring recommendations to the Executive for change and addition.
- ii. Upon a request by the Executive, develop and coordinate proposed changes and additions along with the assistance of other members for Executive consideration.” (Approved 05.13)

The plan: RTOERO adopted a new “Governance document” in 2018 and from that a new “RTO-ERO District Governance Model”

been running for about three years now. This is designed to be an interactive site to encourage communication with our members. Currently we have 84 Followers and 67 Likes. The site highlights webinars and registration for activities, E-newsletters, and RTOERO information from Central and local districts.

was developed. We have been requested by the RTOERO Governance Committee to review our current Constitution (new name - District 23, North York Governance) and bring it into line with the new ‘District Governance Model’ for submission to our Executive for approval.

This process has been done under the guidance of the Constitution Committee {Article 3.01 (b)} composed of Gwen Scriven, Maureen Capotosto, Sara DiNallo and myself.

It is anticipated that the new District bylaw will be presented to the 2021 AM for approval.

There has been be a major reworking of the current Constitution to come in line with the revised

RTOERO Model Governance document. This new Governance document has been approved by the Executive (14.04.21) and is recommended to this Annual Meeting (AM) for approval.

A very few Policy changes were amended by the Executive this year. Some Job Descriptions have had minor amendments by the Executive.

Periodically our Governance document/Constitution is reviewed by

the RTOERO Governance Committee to ensure that it conforms to the RTOERO Model. As a result, our Constitution will be amended substantially at the 2021 AM. The next year review is scheduled for our District in 2022 (this may be changed).

I would like to thank the many Executive members who have assisted me in our work over this past year.

We have new access to experiences that were previously not available. Although some familiar activities are not possible now, we have time and means for other activities that were previously not possible.

In eDevices meetings (by Zoom) we share what we each know

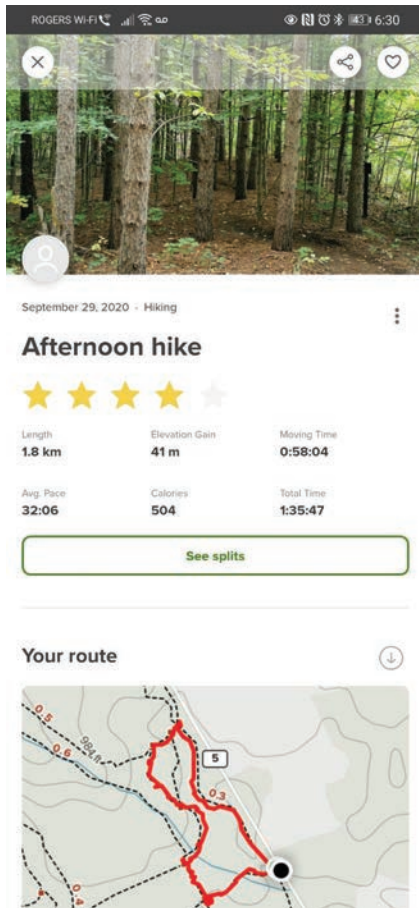
about using technology to take advantage of new opportunities, and to overcome difficulties. Some topics we explore:

- Organizing, editing, and sharing photos.
- Learning from YouTube and Google Search.

additions services, long-term care, and home and community care from one team.

- These components have come together in 2019 as the Ontario Health Teams (OHT) work together in Ontario from the Ministry of Health as a response to “*Hallway Medicine*” and improving health care.

Overall, these webinars that RTOERO offers are very informative and interesting for our members. If you go to the Foundation page on the RTOERO website, you will see things that the Foundation is involved in and working on to improve our lives as we age.

The Foundation raises money to fund research to support programs and ideas to make things happen for us as we age. The Foundation is very proactive when it comes to supporting seniors and ground-breaking in some of the work they do.

Each year, the Goodwill Committee continues to send out cards to the sick, the bereaved and those celebrating significant birthdays. This task is shared with three other dedicated members. In addition to the mailing of cards, telephone calls are made to shut-ins, starting with the oldest member. District 23 members are encouraged to contact the Goodwill Committee if they become aware of anyone who is ill or would welcome a friendly phone call.

Traditionally, the Goodwill Com-

mittee, on behalf of District 23 extends a personal invitation to members 90 years of age along with a guest to attend the yearly AGM/Spring Luncheon. This year, with the pandemic this celebration will not be possible.

As the convener, it is my responsibility to promote and provide the resources and services that are available to those members seeking assistance or information in areas such as health matters, housing, legal issues, care giving and finances. I will continue to bring awareness of the available resources to District 23 members through the STONY Bridges Newsletter. Every month, Member Change Lists are used to update Membership List. I attend monthly Executive meetings and report activities and concerns of the Goodwill Committee.

You can make this election through our website online form (<https://district23.rto-ero.org/opt-in-for-online-newsletters>) or the RTOERO Preferences link at the bottom of all RTOERO communications. *Full disclosure: We opt to receive printed STONY Bridges and Renaissance!*

Cancelling all in-person meetings has not slowed us down a whit. Beginning with Vern's e-Devices group that was the first to go virtual and viral with Zoom, many others have followed suit – Have-a-Java, Book Club and Needlework and Craft. Virtual walks were therefore explored.

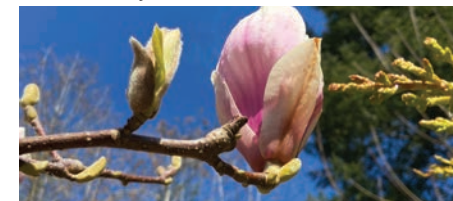

PROJECT SERVICE TO OTHERS REPORT

Our Service to Others Project for 2020/21, Stronger Minds Make for Stronger Kids was well received by our Executive and the Grant Committee. We are fortunate to have been funded the full \$4000 grant. Additionally, our Executive agreed to contribute \$1000 towards this project in lieu of the funds our Needlework & Craft group would normally have raised and donated in non-Covid times.

As a member of the Board of Trustees, Valerie Sterling, a District 23 member is aware of the crucial work of **Strong Minds Strong Kids Psychology Canada** and in particular how the **Kids Have Stress Too!** and **Stress Lessons** programs have been beneficial to students and teachers across Canada. Valerie nominated this organization for the grant to our District 23 Executive and reached out to Anne Lovegrove, Executive Director to determine opportunities to support the organization's

In partnership with the Goodwill committee, we have helped to reach out to isolated seniors with friendly phone calls. I will continue to be vigilant, to monitor media sources for information, and to advocate around our concerns and needs as aging Canadians.

mission of nurturing resilience in children and youth and then worked with me as the Convener to prepare a submission for the grant. We are acutely aware of the effects this pandemic is having on children's mental health and of the need for programs such as these.

This project provides 210 elementary educators in schools with one of the **Kids Have Stress Too!** and **Stress Lessons** electronic program guides. This will help teachers deliver simple lessons with targeted activities in health promotion. They will be able to assist students to become resilient, cope with adversity and change and have meaningful and inclusive participation in their social environments. The participants will also gain increased knowledge of mental health.

As this Project is about delivering psychology and evidence-based programs guides to teachers in the

classroom, it shows how RTOERO members support prevention and early intervention strategies and gives educators the tools to support their students. This project demonstrates to the schools and the general public that RTOERO retired members have an understanding of the focus on the mental well-being of children. We support building stronger partnerships between sectors to support children and create healthy communities.

We see a number of benefits to this partnership project because:

- from an educational perspective, students become more engaged in the classroom when their stress is managed. Educators, also, learn from the program, benefitting from the strategies and tactics to manage their own stress.
- from a community perspective, students share their knowledge of stress and stress management strategies with their family and friends giving a greater reach and the benefits of community wide mental health promotion.
- socially, as we promote mental health and the building blocks to a stronger foundation of mental health with our children, our society will benefit in the long-term mitigating the need for treatment for mental health issues.

We have highlighted the project in STONY Bridges. We have asked

our members to nominate teachers to receive these materials. It is a good project to attract future members and get our new members involved and understanding our commitment to community organizations and the well-being of children.

We presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of **Strong Minds Strong Kids Psychology Canada** making them aware of RTOERO, the Service to Others Project, its membership, its organization and how it values partnerships supporting schools and students. We stated that we are very grateful to be able to share these excellent resources and to work with them in promoting the management of stress through the resources being provided.

We have also worked with Anne Marie Chudleigh, Assistant Professor & MT Partnership Coordinator, Master of Teaching Program Curriculum, Teaching and Learning Department at OISE to offer this resource to host teachers who mentored faculty students in their placements.

Finally, the Toronto Catholic District School Board is providing the guides to their teachers to launch their virtual summer programs. They are embedding some of the lessons and the content into programs for students this upcoming summer. "We were actually thinking of launching the Kids Have Stress Too and Stress Lessons program in our virtual school. Your email and this news are very

timely. We are just in the planning stages right now. This is just what we needed to kick start the initiative." Marie-Josée Gendron, Chief of Mental Health Strategy and Staff Well-Being TCDSB
