Opening, Responding, Overcalling, Competing, Doubling.....a few reflections!

What should I bid with this hand? Often, the answer is "pass"! In 1st seat, or in 2nd seat after a pass, holding 12-13 or 18-19 HCP, open 1 of a major with a 5-card suit. Be a little more aggressive if your suit is spades. Lacking a 5 card major but holding 4 diamonds, open 1D, otherwise float a trial balloon by bidding 1C. With 15-17 HCP and a balanced hand (at most one doubleton) open 1 No Trump. In 3rd seat after two passes, open 1S with a slightly weaker hand if you hold a solid 5-card spade suit. It makes life harder for your opponent in 4th seat.

Preemptive bidding is most effective in 3rd seat, especially after 2 passes when the opponent in 4th seat may have a strong hand. Ideally, the hand should contain 2 of the top 3 cards or 3 of the top 5 in the long suit. A hand with a long spade suit is most effective in blocking the opponents. A 2S opening bid is a killer! An overcall (a bid following an opponent's 1-level opener) will often be based on a hand with 9 - 11 HCP and a good 5-card spade suit. Partner should be aware that an overcall may be weak but should raise to the level of the partnership's total trump holding, even with a bust hand. e.g. After 1H 1S 2C bid 4S even with a Yarborough (zero HCP) and 5 low spades! Compete whenever possible! Be willing to double when opponents are blatantly stealing your game!

As Political Advocacy Convener, I am looking forward to another busy year. LIFE Institute

The most significant event during my time on the executive was the creation of the LIFE Institute (Learning Is For Ever). We began with a survey of the aging population to determine educational and recreational needs of the growing elderly population.

The project demonstrated a significant gap in the educational needs of seniors and also found an enormous reservoir of talent within that population. Seniors were willing to share their knowledge, talents and skills and were capable of providing leadership and expertise to create an association that would deliver educational experiences for themselves.

Ryerson Institute, North York Board of Education, Retired Teachers of North York and Elderhostel Canada combined to help create the new organization. Interested people were invited to a workshop at Ryerson in October 1990 where the concept of Independent Learning in Retirement (L.I.R.) was described. By the end of the day the LIFE Institute was established. A steering committee was appointed and in the spring of 1991 there were 87 members and a curriculum of nine self-directed courses was presented.

LIFE was born with its home and support at Ryerson, financial aid from the North York Board of Education, personnel and volunteers from the Retired Teachers of North York and encouragement and workshops provided by Elderhostel Canada.

Programs for 50+

Geoff Arnold, Past President (1990/1991) and Executive Member (1989-1992) of RTO District 23, was one of the founding members of the largest of our Programs for 50+ in Continuing Education at Ryerson University - the LIFE Institute (Learning Is For Ever). Geoff was the Past President of the Superannuated Teachers of North York (STONY), who, along with the North York Board of Education, Elderhostel Canada and Ryerson University were cofounders of this newly formed organization dedicated to later life learning in the liberal arts. Geoff was named as the STONY representative on that new LIFE board – ex officio – and became a very active participant/student!

LIFE is now a well-known membership-based not-for-profit, in partnership with Programs for 50+ and Community Engagement at the G. Raymond Chang School of Continuing Education. While LIFE offers peer-led study groups and lecture classes in the arts, humanities, sciences, and technology, Programs for 50+ also boasts unique non-credit programming.

The Estelle Craig Act II STUDIO: This is a unique theatre program and creative drama centre that welcome students from all walks of life and all levels of experience to actively study acting, playwriting and directing in a positive, supportive community in which they can learn, create, and perform.

Music Program: It began with courses in singing and has now expanded to include a performance choir, music appreciation courses, and a tri-annual concert series.

Media Arts: Currently, this program provides opportunities to learn more about film through its much beloved film club, special film series courses, and hand-on trainings, such as "make-a movie".

Caring Clowns: If you want to make a meaningful change in your life, this is the program for you. Students learn about dementia and clowning techniques (think less clown make-up and more your zany aunt Maggie), and volunteer in one of the 10 Toronto Long-Term Care Homes bringing joy to those with Alzheimer's and dementia.

In addition to its Continued Learning stream, Programs for 50+ has two other pillars of programming: Lifestyle and Wellness and Community Engagement. Lifestyle and Wellness provides opportunities to engage in special workshops, unique volunteer experiences, and second and third career training programs. Through Community Engagement, older adults can become involved in the annual 50+ Festival, a bi-monthly lecture series, and even research opportunities.



Project Service To Others Report

The National Council of Jewish Women of Canada, Toronto (NCJWC, Toronto) has undertaken a Turning The Page project—building children's libraries in shelters for abused women and their children. They transform a space in women's shelters in Toronto into a library that will be a haven of warmth and security for the children.

A woman and her children who are fleeing an abusive situation will often have only the clothes on their backs and a few of their personal belongings with them. While shelters struggle to provide clothing, food, and support to these families, they seldom have the resources to provide the educational benefits and quiet comfort of a library. Turning The Page was conceived to fill this gap. "This is a healing place, a place of inspiration and motivation, an oasis in the midst of chaos." (Executive Director, Nellies Shelter, the fourth Turning The Page Library site)

Shelters are temporary and transitional facilities. Therefore, the goal is to enable each child to be gifted with their favourite book(s) on leaving the facility and continually restocking the bookshelves.

Additionally, NCJWC, Toronto is exploring collaborative programs of reading, writing, and a homework club to enhance the library experience. There are unfortunately many women's shelters in the GTA, and their goal is to provide each one with a Turning The Page library.

RTO/ERO District 23, North York has decided to work with the NCJWC, Toronto to create one of these libraries as a Project Service to Others in 2018/19. We will provide pocket pillows created by our Needlework & Craft Group to hold the gifted books and promote the involvement of members in the collaborative programs. We have applied to the provincial office for a PSTO grant of up to \$4000 for this project. We will know the results of this application in the early fall. In addition, we will donate money raised through the work of the Needlework & Craft group.

Members attending the Champagne Breakfast or the Anniversary Gala are invited to bring a children's book as a donation for the children in the shelters who will be using the Turning the Page library.







Room for a Child 2017/18 PSTO Report

This year's STO funding in District 23 has been given to Room for a Child, an Ontario non-profit organization founded by a retired principal.

Room for a Child creates beautiful bedrooms for children living in poverty. This is done with donated furniture and décor items as well as volunteer labour. There is no charge to the recipient families.

Families are referred to Room for a Child by school principals, social workers, settlement workers and public health nurses. Many come from school boards, but some are referred through Children's Aid and from women's shelters.

There are four steps in the service process after a family is referred to Room for a Child. The first is the initial meeting with the parent to hear what they feel is needed, to learn a little about the child's interests, to measure and photograph the space. Stage two is the preparation of the room. This may include patching drywall, repairing electrical, priming and painting walls and ceiling. This may take more than one day especially if siblings sharing more than one room.

The third visit is installation day. This includes transporting and installing any needed furniture, hanging win-

The third visit is installation day. This includes transporting and installing any needed furniture, hanging window coverings and providing new linens and school supplies.

The final visit is with the parent and sometimes the child(ren) as well. This is when children often give us letters and pictures they have made to let us know the impact of our efforts. They are always gratefully received, and many are on the organization's website www.roomforachild.ca The site also provides more information and lots of before and after photos of room transformations.

Room for a Child is most grateful to District 23 both for their PSTO funding and for further support through fundraising at regular meetings. In addition, numerous members have chosen to volunteer their time and talents. Many thanks.





The Birth of STO/ERO

Excerpted from material first published in 1993 in the STO/ERO Book of Memories

by Arthur McAdam (1899-1993), First President of the Superannuated Teachers of Ontario (STO/ERO), 1968-69

would like to tell you about the birth of STO/ERO. To begin, I shall use a saying I heard when I was a boy: "It was the last straw that broke the camel's back." We shall leave the camel with its driver, but we shall retain the last straw.

In 1965, the Canada Pension Plan was introduced to take effect on January 1, 1966. Premier John Robarts determined that this pension should not be stacked on top of pensions to which the Ontario government contributed and which it guaranteed. At a meeting with the Ontario Teachers' Federation

She lamented to me that the superannuated teachers were not organized.

(OTF) he proposed that the teachers' contributions to the Canada Pension Plan be paid out of the 6% contribution to the Teachers' Superannuation Fund. When a teacher retired, that person would receive a pension earned by the combined contribution – in no case would it be less than a regular superannuation pension. If the combined pension were more than a regular pension, the teacher would get the benefit.

At about the same time, the government voted to compute teacher pensions on the best seven years' salaries – a real improvement since salaries were rising. But when OTF enquired what the government intended to do for those already on pension because they had contributed the 6%, too, the answer was "Nothing."

NOTHING? Nora Hodgins, Secretary of OTF, was perturbed. For 20 years the welfare of these people had been part of her responsibility. For them to be ignored was of great concern to Nora. She lamented to me that the superannuated teachers were not organized. If they were, their numbers and expertise could be combined with OTF and maybe the government could be persuaded to do something for those who had taught on low salaries and had low pensions.

I listened attentively because I was one of those whose pension was computed on the best 10 years' service. Her plan seemed reasonable and I thought that as long as she was perturbed there was a chance we might achieve something! Having thought over what Nora had said, I wrote to her outlining a plan for the organization of the superannuated teachers.

In a teachers' meeting, if you dared to move a motion or offer a constructive suggestion, you found yourself with a job...in due time I received a letter on OTF stationery: By motion of the OTF Executive, I was instructed to form a committee and proceed to organize the superannuated teachers!

I discussed the matter with Norman McLeod and he agreed to help. We formed a committee of 10. OTF adopted us as one of its committees and paid our expenses and let us use its facilities. We owe a great deal to OTF for its help. Without it we could not have started.

We drafted a letter to all superannuated teachers stating our purpose, the form of a proposed constitution and the objectives for such an organization. This was approved by OTF. The letter asked each person to submit the name of a retired teacher who had been a member of that person's former affiliate and who consented to be nominated for election to an organization of retired teachers. This letter was mailed to every superannuated teacher in Ontario. We did not receive 4,000 nominations, but there was a mail bag full!

Notes from the Provincial Pension and Retirement Concerns Committee

The PRCC workshop for district representatives that was cancelled due to the ice storm in April has been rescheduled for October 14 - 15, 2018. The focus of this workshop will be dealing with social isolation of seniors.

Pension Plans Annual Results

Both OMERS and the OTPP plans show steady growth with excellent returns for 2017.

OMERS is 94% funded. In 2017, they have shown a net rate return of 11.5% with net assets of 95 billion dollars. They have 482,000 members and have paid out 4 billion dollars in pension during the last fiscal year an equal amount that was collected. Their active to retired ratio is 2:1. Their strategic plan shows that they will be fully funded in 2020.

OTPP is 105% funded. In 2017, they have shown a net rate return of 9.7% with net assets of 189.5 billion dollars. They have 323,000 members and have paid out 5,927 billion dollars in pension during the last fiscal year while 3,385 was collected from contributions. Their active to retired ratio is 1.3:1. The 10.3 billion dollar surplus was placed in a reserve. The purpose of the contingency reserve is to reduce volatility in the funded position of the Plan and to facilitate stability in Plan members' contributions and benefits (including inflation protection) in the event that future results show a decline in Plan assets and/or an increase in Plan liabilities.
